

Hand Therapy Team – X-ray Results

This leaflet explains more about what happens after you have had an x-ray of your hand or wrist taken. If you have any further questions or concerns, please speak to the therapist who referred you for the x-ray.

When will I get my results?

The results of your x-ray images will either be discussed at your next hand therapy appointment with your therapist or at your outpatient clinic appointment with your consultant or a member of their team.

How will I be informed of my results?

You will be informed of your results verbally by your therapist and/or consultant.

Will my GP be informed?

We do not routinely contact GPs regarding x-ray results, however as you are under the care of the Hand Unit at St George's, your consultant will write to your GP at regular intervals to keep them informed of your progress.

What happens if I miss my appointment where my results were going to be discussed?

Your therapist will contact you to discuss your results by telephone. If another appointment is required, your therapist will arrange this for you.
