
Dr Hannah Barham-Brown is the Deputy Chair of the JDF

Exception reporting


In September, the JDF heard sobering evidence from an anonymous survey of Foundation Year 1 doctors at St George's. The survey conducted by the GMC's regional liaison advisor for South London found that **36%** of FY1s felt pressure not to exception report



This is worrying. St George's is committed to ensuring that staff views are incorporated into everything it does. And it is the role of Clinical and Non-Clinical Managers to create the right conditions and environment for staff to be heard. With the <u>2017 NHS Staff Survey</u> due to be circulated by 9 October, we urge leaders to positively encourage feedback from trainees through the exception reporting system.

The S word

This month Serena Haywood's blog focuses on the S word. If you only have time to read a bit, <u>read the first paragraph</u>. Doctors are at a higher risk of suicide than the general population and the suicide rate amongst women doctors is much higher than the general population and equal to that of male doctors.
