

Research highlights and achievements

Research is vital to improve treatments and the way care is delivered in the Emergency Department. Our vision is to embed research as a core activity in the ED, and that every patient and member of staff in the ED should have the opportunity to be part of a research study if they wish. Studies are conducted to a set of quality, safety and monitoring standards specific to research.

We have gone some way to achieving our ambition in 2018/19, recruiting more participants to research studies than any other ED in the UK, with 1,049 participants.



The achievements of our research staff were recognised at a national level.

- Our academic lead, Professor Heather Jarman, was awarded the inaugural Royal College of Nursing 'Emergency Nurse of the Year' in 2018 for her work establishing and leading the research unit
- The whole research reached the final of the EDGE research management system 'Clinical Users of the Year' awards held in Birmingham



Achievements


We set some ambitious objectives for the research unit to achieve in 2018/19 and were successful in a number of key areas. A summary is below:

Research capability

- Opened 'The ED-CO study', our 1st study with a grant award and an ED Chief Investigator
- Developed 5 new ED Principal Investigators, including our 1st trainee principal investigator (tPI)
- Increased the number of academic publications from ED staff
- Funded a specific research space to enable a dedicated area for academics and others to learn and develop research skills
- Supporting a nurse researcher undertaking an NIHR pre-doctoral clinical academic fellowship (PCAF)

Research capacity

- Expanded the research delivery team to 5 full-time equivalent nurses to increase recruitment in to clinical studies. This has enabled 16 nurses to undertake secondments to the team to develop research skills
- Supported 4 research nurses to complete the National Institute for Health Research (NIHR) 'Introduction to research' course



- Professor Heather Jarman has continued in her role as Clinical Research Network specialty lead for Injuries and Emergency studies across all Trusts in South London
- We maintain strong links and involvement in the Paediatric Emergency Research in the UK and Ireland (PERUKI) network, collaborating on a wide range of studies and publications
- Professor Heather Jarman is on the leadership team for the Emergency Care Research Incubator, an NIHR / RCEM initiative aimed at enhancing research capacity in emergency practice










Research outputs

Recruitment to research studies

In 2018/19, a total of 1,049 people were recruited into studies run by the research unit. This was an increase of 328 on the previous year. This figure has been increasing each year since the research unit opened in 2015.

We know there is more to we can do to increase access to research for patients and staff. In 2019/20 we hope to build on future success and remain leading recruiters in to clinical studies.

Our main objectives for 2019/20 are:

Increase research capability

- Identify and support clinical staff wishing to pursue clinical academic careers
- Encourage applications to the small grants fund for development of research projects
- Fund post-graduate research training (PGCert, MRes) for clinical staff
- Increase the number of honorary contracts / joint clinical academic appointments with Higher Education Institutes to support research
- Identify opportunities for research mentorship for novice researchers
- Develop an Out Of Programme Research (OOPR) post for EM trainee and specific clinical fellow (research) post

Build a research culture

- Hold research awareness events and training for all staff groups
- Introduce 'taster' days with the research team for NMAHPs
- Expand student placement opportunities with the research team

Increasing research capacity

- Increase number of studies open to recruitment
- Increase the proportion of studies involving children
- Review the responsibilities and structure of the research team to maximise effectiveness of the roles
