WHAT WE DO

We want to deliver outstanding care, every time for our patients, staff and the communities we serve.

With 9,000 staff we are the largest healthcare provider, major teaching hospital and tertiary centre for south west London, Surrey and beyond.

Most of our services are provided at St George's Hospital in Tooting, but we also have services at Queen Mary's Hospital in Roehampton, and in the community.

LOCAL AND NATIONAL SERVICES

We provide care for patients from a larger catchment area in south east England for specialist services such as complex pelvic trauma. A number of our services treat patients from across England – these include family HIV care, bone marrow transplantation for noncancer diseases, and penile cancer.

CLINICAL NETWORKS

We also play a key role within clinical networks. These networks include the South London Cardiac and Stroke Network, and the South West London and Surrey Trauma Network, for which St George's Hospital is the designated heart attack centre, hyper-acute stroke unit and major trauma centre.

April 2018

June 2018

Quadruplets born at St George's for first time in 13 years

A team of more than 30 people, led by Professor Asma Khalil, delivered quadruplets for the first time in 13 years at St George's.

Hindu Kaye-Kisambira, 27 from Cobham, gave birth to quadruplets – two identical twin girls and two twin boys – on 21 June.

July 2018

Trust staff celebrate 70 years of the NHS

To mark the 70th birthday of the NHS, a range of events and activities were organised as a way for our staff, patients and the local community to mark the occasion.

Hundreds of people attended our Big 7Tea parties, while over 70 members of staff took part in our Big Birthday Walk from the site of the old St George's at Hyde Park to our Tooting home.

Baby who survives after heart stops beating for 22 minutes turns one

Lacey Sherriff was born more than three months prematurely and was transferred to St George's for urgent specialist surgery. During the operation, Lacey's heart stopped beating for a total of 22 minutes.

Our team didn't give up on Lacey, and supported her in every way they could to help her pull through.

February 2019

Recruitment to clinical trials at St George's tops 10,000 patients in a year for the first time

Over 10,000 patients were recruited into clinical trials in 2018/19, the first time we've passed this important milestone during a 12 month period.

Our Emergency Department (ED) now offers HIV testing to all patients, aged 18-59, as part of their routine blood tests. This new approach will lead to earlier diagnosis and ensure people can begin treatment and lead long and healthy lives.

MEET OUR NEW **LEAD GOVERNOR**



In July 2019, we were pleased to announce the election of Richard Mycroft as our new Lead Governor. Richard, who has represented south west Lambeth as a St George's Governor since 2017, replaced Kathryn Harrison in the role.

The Council of Governors have an important role in making Foundation Trusts better for patients and staff. They hold non-executive directors to account for the performance of the Board, and represent the interests of Trust members and the public.

After his election, Richard said: "For me, the role is so important in representing the interests of the public and ensuring Governors' can work collaboratively with the Trust's leadership to deliver the best healthcare possible.

"I'm looking forward to Governors' continuing to be a voice for the public by better understanding Members' views. This is an interesting and challenging time, not just for the Trust, but for the NHS as a whole.

"We have a tremendous level of admiration from those who themselves, or family or friends have been treated here. It would be great to turn that admiration to positive support.

"There is always a need for the public to scrutinise what is happening, which is a key role for Governors. I'm sure there will be lots of opportunities for productive engagement with our members."

Richard was elected as Lead Governor following a vote of the 25 Governors who currently make up our Council of Governors.

Improvements to our performance have been made over the past two years, but it is still not as consistent as we want. We are determined to see, diagnose and treat patients more rapidly, and provide high quality care in the process. Performance in our Emergency Department at St George's is an area we will continue to focus on. We need to manage flow better throughout the organisation, for the benefit of both patients and staff.

The Trust returned to reporting its planned operation activity (Referral to Treatment data) in January 2019 after a break of over two years. Since then, there has been a sizeable reduction in the number of patients waiting over 52 weeks for their first treatment – which is a big step forward.
