



Taking Mycophenolate Mofetil following Kidney Transplant

This leaflet aims to answer your questions about taking mycophenolate mofetil following your kidney transplant. If you have any questions or concerns, please speak to a doctor or nurse caring for you.

What is mycophenolate mofetil?

Mycophenolate mofetil belongs to a group of medicines called immunosuppressants or antirejection medication. It works by reducing the body's immune system to prevent your body from rejecting your transplanted kidney.

What does mycophenolate mofetil look like and how should it be stored?

Mycophenolate mofetil is available as 250mg capsules and 500mg film-coated tablets. They should be stored in their original container at room temperature, out of reach and out of sight of children.



How do I take mycophenolate mofetil?

Mycophenolate mofetil should be taken twice a day, twelve hours apart at 10am and 10pm. It must be taken at the same time each day and it is vital not to miss any doses. Mycophenolate mofetil should be swallowed whole with a glass of water. It may be taken with or without food.

Following a kidney transplant mycophenolate mofetil is usually started at a dose of 1,000mg twice a day and reduced to 500mg twice a day after 30 days. Do not stop taking mycophenolate mofetil unless advised to do so by your transplant consultant.

What should I do if I forget to take mycophenolate mofetil?

If you forget to take a dose, take it as soon as you remember. If it is almost time for your next dose miss the dose and continue as normal. Never take a double dose to catch up for a missed dose. If you take too much mycophenolate mofetil speak to your doctor straightaway.

Are there any side effects?

Side-effect	Advice
Increased risk of infection	 You may be prescribed medication to reduce this risk. Avoid contact with people known to have infections. Speak to your doctor if you experience any signs of infection (e.g., fever, sore throat).
Reduced blood cell numbers	 Your blood tests will be monitored in transplant clinic. Speak to your doctor if you experience signs of infection or have unexpected bruising or bleeding.
May increase risk of skin cancer	Use an SPF50 sun cream daily, even during winter.
Stomach upset (nausea, vomiting, diarrhoea, pain)	Speak to your transplant clinic if you are concerned or if you vomit shortly after taking.

What should I avoid whilst taking mycophenolate mofetil?

Before buying any over-the-counter medicine, herbal medication or supplements, seek advice from your transplant clinic or pharmacist. During each appointment, please inform your transplant clinic of any new medication prescribed elsewhere. Speak to your transplant clinic before receiving any vaccines.

Contraception advice whilst taking mycophenolate mofetil

Mycophenolate mofetil can cause birth defects and miscarriage. If you are a woman who could become pregnant, you must provide a negative pregnancy test before starting treatment and must follow the contraception advice given to you by your doctor. If you are male and your partner may become pregnant you must also follow the contraception advice given to you by your doctor.

If you are planning to become pregnant speak to your transplant consultant who will consider switching you to alternative anti-rejection medication.

How do I get a repeat prescription?

Mycophenolate mofetil will be prescribed by your transplant clinic (not your GP) so please inform them when you are running low. Wherever possible it will be supplied via home delivery.
