

Oral Glucose Tolerance Test for Tall Stature

This leaflet explains what an oral glucose tolerance test is and what you can expect when you come to the hospital. If you have any further questions, please speak to a doctor or nurse caring for you.

What is an oral glucose tolerance test for tall stature?

This test measures levels of growth hormone in the body and is usually done if your child is very tall for his / her age.

How can I prepare for this test?

To ensure reliable and accurate results, it is important that your child has a normal balanced diet for at least five days before the test. You must ensure that your child has nothing to eat or drink from midnight of the evening before the test. They may only drink water on the morning of the test. Once the test has been completed your child will be offered something to eat and drink on the ward.

What happens during the test?

The oral glucose tolerance test is performed over two hours. At the beginning of the test, both a urine sample and a blood test are taken before giving a sugary drink. After two hours, further urine and blood samples will be required at the end of the test.

A local anaesthetic cream or spray may be used to numb the area of skin where a small needle / plastic tube (cannula) is inserted into a vein in your child's hand or arm and left in place for the duration of the test. If the cream is used, this needs to be applied 30-45 minutes before the insertion of the cannula. The cannula will be inserted prior to the sugary drink being given. Alternatively, if preferred, two separate blood tests can be done.

Your child should not have anything to eat throughout the test but may drink water only. You should expect to be on the ward for around three or four hours. Before going home, your child's blood sugar is re-checked to make sure that it is normal before the cannula is removed.
