

# Respiratory Physiology Lung Function and Sleep Unit Bronchial Challenge testing using Mannitol

This leaflet explains about your Mannitol challenge test, including the benefits, risks, alternative options and what you can expect when you come to hospital. If you have any further questions, please speak to a healthcare professional caring for you.

### What is a Mannitol challenge test?

Mannitol is a naturally occurring sugar which, when inhaled in small doses under controlled conditions, mimics the body's response to an allergen. It changes the amount of fluid in the airways which causes an inflammatory response. The classic example of this is hay fever or the inflammation seen after an insect bite. In people with asthma there is an over-reaction to Mannitol within the airways. This is hypersensitivity of the airways. A "mannitol challenge" test is a simple test that involves inhaling a fine mannitol powder via an inhaler and performing a breathing test at each dose.

## Why should I have a Mannitol challenge test?

You have been referred for a Mannitol challenge test to confirm or rule out a diagnosis of asthma by identifying whether the airways are hypersensitive. This could be due to the presence of a cough of unknown origin which is often a symptom of asthma.

#### What does the test involve?

The procedure will be explained to you in detail on the day of the test. You will be asked to inhale increasing amounts of Mannitol and the response of your airways will be measured after each dose by asking you to breathe in as deeply as possible and then to blow out as quickly as possible into a machine through a disposable mouthpiece with your nose sealed with a nose clip. You will be asked to repeat each step up to nine times, following which you may be administered an inhaler and be asked to repeat the breathing test one last time.

# How can I prepare for my Mannitol challenge test?

Please **stop taking** the following medication for the time stated prior to your appointment:

Please note: If you are struggling without your respiratory medication and it is clinically needed to be administered, please take your medication but notify us immediately as your appointment will most likely need to be rescheduled. We will not be able to give Mannitol if you have taken your respiratory medication.

# What must I NOT DO before my Mannitol challenge test?

- Do not smoke for at least six hours prior to the test.
- Do not undertake vigorous exercise on the day of the test.
- Do not wear any tight clothing that may restrict your breathing.
- Do not eat a heavy meal for two hours prior to the test.
- Do not drink coffee, tea, cola drinks, chocolate or other drinks / food containing caffeine on the day of the test.
- Do not take alcohol for four hours prior to testing.

### Please contact us if

- You are coughing up blood.
- You have had a heart attack or stroke in the last three months.
- You have had an aortic aneurysm.
- You have had recent eye surgery.
- You have uncontrolled hypertension or intracranial pressure elevation risk.
- You are pregnant or breast-feeding.
- You have hypersensitivity to Mannitol or to gelatine as this is used to make the Mannitol capsules.
- The results will go to the referring clinician who will explain them to you at your next clinic appointment. Please note that you will not be given the results on the day of your test.
- If you are unsure about whether you need to stop any medication or have any questions about this test, please contact us using the telephone number on this leaflet.

## Will I experience any discomforts or side effects?

The test is safe. The powder may make your throat dry and we will provide you with water during the test. Sometimes the test may make you cough or short of breath. Any test symptoms can be reversed using another inhaler (Salbutamol) that is given, if needed at the end of the test.
