Wave goodbye and say hello

A thank you and goodbye - End of an Era - A legacy of leadership and public service



In March 2025, we saw the ending of an era as Gillian Norton OBE stood down from her role as Chairman after almost 40 years in senior leadership roles spanning both local government and the NHS.

Gillian - who was Chair of St George's for over eight years and also served six years at Epsom and St Helier – was thanked by colleagues across the group.



Gillian played a pivotal role to gesh, having lead St George's out of financial special measures, steered both Trusts through the unprecedented challenges of the COVID-19 pandemic, and overseeing the formation of our group.

Group Chief Executive, Jacqueline Totterdell said: "Gillian's warmth, compassion and leadership has helped us to become a more inclusive and collaborative organisation where every voice is valued. This is why she is so highly regarded by everyone at gesh and we'll miss her dearly."

Gillian's commitment to public service extends far beyond her work in the NHS. She has a distinguished background in local government, having served as a council leader and earning an OBE in the 2017 Queen's Birthday Honours List for



services to local government and the communities of Richmond upon Thames.

Reflecting on her time at gesh, Gillian shared: "Did I enjoy it? The short answer is yes. I loved talking to staff and patients. But I've been working for 50 years, and it's time to take things a bit slower."

Gillian's successor is Sir Mark Lowcock who took up the role of Chair in April 2025.

Hello - Sir Mark Lowcock succeeds Gillian Norton as Chairman from April 2025



Sir Mark Lowcock was appointed as Chair of gesh in April 2025 as Gillian Norton's tenure as Chairman came to an end.

Sir Mark is a committed public servant and joins gesh after a distinguished career in both the Civil Service and international humanitarian leadership. He previously served as Permanent Secretary of the Department for International Development between 2011 and 2017, and at the United Nations as the Under Secretary General for Humanitarian Affairs and Emergency Relief Coordinator between 2017 and 2021.

Sir Mark brings a wealth of experience in government as well as international experience to the NHS, which includes supporting dramatic improvements in life expectancy in Africa and South Asia and coordinating UN humanitarian assistance in countries across the world affected by natural disaster and conflict.

Sir Mark said: "It is a privilege to be appointed Chair of gesh and to lead an organisation which cares so compassionately for the people of Southwest London and Surrey. "The NHS is facing very significant challenges, but I am committed to ensuring that we continue providing the highest possible standard of care for our patients, while also looking after our colleagues, making our Group financially sustainable, embracing innovation, and working collaboratively with our partners."

Group Chief Executive, Jacqueline Totterdell, said: "I'm really thrilled to have Sir Mark as our new Chair.

"He joins us at a time of opportunity – we are strengthening our ties with partners such as City St George's, University of London to drive forward research and innovation, improve our services and develop our staff.

"I look forward to working with Sir Mark to continue delivering the care we are proud of."

Enhancing care for motor neurone disease patients



Last year, St George's Hospital, in partnership with Motor Neurone Disease (MND) Association, launched the MND Care and Research Network in Southwest London and Surrey.

This was a significant milestone in the journey towards St George's Hospital improving the lives of those affected by motor neurone disease across Southwest London and Surrey.

Building on the achievements of our specialist MND clinic, opened in 2017, the network offers improved coordination and access to services for approximately 180 people living with motor neurone disease in the region.

The launch of the network also saw a MND Care Co-Ordinator, based at St George's Hospital, becoming the single point of contact for people with MND, ensuring a joined-up approach to individual care plans and signposting to extra support for them and their loved ones.

Without this role, the complexities of the disease mean people affected by MND would be in touch with numerous healthcare professionals at any one time, which can be overwhelming and exhausting.

The co-ordinator links in with eight community MND multidisciplinary teams, eight hospices and eight district general hospitals in the area, supplementing the care already provided and enabling the development of the network over the next four years.

As well as offering specialist clinical care, St George's are continuing to support people to take part in MND research.



Celebrating continued excellence in Sterile Services



We are proud to share that our Sterile Services Department (SSD) has once again successfully maintained its certification to ISO 13485:2016 and the UK Medical Devices Regulations 2002 (UK MDR 2002), following a thorough external audit carried out by Intertek from 28–30 May 2025.

This certification confirms that our SSD continues to meet the high standards required to sterilise medical devices—a regulated and safety-critical activity. What's more, SSD is independently registered with the Medicines and Healthcare products Regulatory Agency (MHRA) as a Medical Device Manufacturer.

To maintain this status, SSD must run a robust Quality Management System. Every step in the sterilisation process is documented, and every pack processed can be traced back through those records. This ensures the highest standards of patient safety and care.



Annual inspections by MHRA agents ensure we stay compliant, and this recent audit is further confirmation that we are doing just that.

A huge congratulations and thank you to our SSD team for their continued dedication and excellence.

St George's Consultant featured in documentary on Andrew Flintoff's crash recovery





A new Disney+ documentary that aired in April shares the personal journey of former England cricket captain Andrew "Freddie" Flintoff following a life-threatening crash while filming Top Gear in December 2022 — and it includes a tribute to the expert care he received at St George's.

Flintoff sustained devastating facial injuries when the three-wheeled Morgan Super 3 sports car he was driving flipped at speed, dragging him along the tarmac at Dunsfold Aerodrome in Surrey. In the immediate aftermath, he was airlifted to St George's, where he underwent emergency surgery under the care of Consultant Oral and Maxillofacial Surgeon Jahrad Haq.



In the documentary, Flintoff bravely opens up about the severity of the crash and the emotional toll it took — revealing that he feared he had lost his face, and at times struggled to imagine getting through the recovery.

Mr Haq, who features in the documentary, reflects on the moment he was called in:

"I was on call that day and received a phone call from the A&E consultant. A lot of injuries are managed at a more junior level before escalating, so I knew this one was serious. Of all the trauma cases I've seen in over 20 years, this was among the top five most complex."

Mr Haq explains that Flintoff sustained significant soft and hard tissue trauma, including broken and lost teeth, and fractures to the upper jawbone.

Flintoff, who now shows a fully healed face, credits the skill of the St George's team with helping him on his path to recovery. He spent several months out of the public eye, gradually rebuilding physically and emotionally with the help of family, clinicians, and surgical experts.



The documentary, which is titled Flintoff, is available to stream in the UK on Disney Plus so why not have a look and see what brilliant staff we have at St George's.

Rapper Dave funds a new scheme supporting our discharged elderly patients



Rapper Dave aka Santan Dave has helped fund a new scheme that helps our elderly patients when they're discharged.

Free packs filled with essential items such as toiletries, tea, coffee and comforting items such as non-slip socks will be given to patients to help them settle back into their own home smoothly.

The packs are provided by The Juliet O Foundation – a charity set up by Dave's mum Juliet Omorgie – in partnership with St George's Hospital Charity. St



George's patients are the first to benefit from the new initiative.

Juliet, a health and social care worker for more than 35 years, established the foundation to help elderly patients with their transition back home after a stay in hospital.

She said: "We believe that these discharge packs can make a real difference in the recovery process for elderly patients. Our goal is to provide comfort and care as they transition home, and we are thrilled to partner with St George's Hospital Charity to deliver these to those who need them most."

Around 100 patients a month will benefit from the packs which are all tailored to meet the recipient's needs.

Promoting health awareness at Diwali celebrations



Doctors from St George's joined a team promoting health awareness at the London Mayor's Diwali Celebrations.

The Diwali Celebrations in the Square is the largest public celebration event outside of the cities in the Indian subcontinent. It was a great opportunity to bring the message of health awareness and promoting healthy living to people joining the celebrations in London.

Dr Padmini Parathasarthy (GP), Dr Sana Mallick (Medicine) and Professor Indranil Chakravorty MBE (Acute Medicine) were among the team from St George's joining others from Health Protection Agency, NHS England, BAPIO Research and South Asian Health Action at the Health Awareness Tent. Through conversations with the hundreds of people of all age groups who thronged the Square, the team checked health status, screen for hypertension, and promote healthy eating, regular exercise and lifestyle choices.

The Mayor of London Sadiq Khan was very grateful for all the work that health care staff do for people in London and congratulated the team on the work on health promotion reaching out to South Asian people who are at higher risk.

Re-accreditation hat-trick for our Anaesthetic Department



St George's Hospital's Anaesthetic Department has proudly secured Anaesthesia Clinical Services Accreditation (ACSA) re-accreditation for the third time in a row, placing us amongst an exclusive group of hospitals to earn such recognition.

To mark this achievement, there was an ACSA award ceremony where the Anaesthetic Department was presented with a plaque by Dr Ramai Santhirapala, a representative from the Royal College of Anaesthetists.



ACSA, a program run by the Royal College of Anaesthetists (RCoA), allows departments to showcase excellence in crucial areas such as patient experience and safety.

Notably, St George's was the fourth hospital in the country to receive ACSA accreditation when it was first launched back in 2015, highlighting the department's long-standing commitment to delivering the best care to our patients.

St George's Interventional Radiologist recognised internationally for his contributions



Professor Robert Morgan, St George's Interventional Radiologist and current President of the British Society of Interventional Radiology, has been awarded the gold medal from the APSCVIR – the Asia Pacific Society of Cardiovascular and Interventional Radiology - for his exceptional contributions to interventional radiology on a global scale.



Robert Leatherby wins Sol Cohen Founder's Prize for Clinical Research



We are pleased to share that Robert Leatherby, Vascular Surgery Research Fellow & Specialty Registrar, was awarded the Sol Cohen Founder's Prize by the Vascular Society of Great Britain and Ireland for the best clinical oral presentation at their annual meeting in November 2024. This award recognises significant contributions to vascular research and clinical practice.

Robert's presentation, titled "The natural history of splenic artery aneurysms: A decade's experience of surveillance and management at a large tertiary vascular unit", summarised ten years of research conducted at St George's.

This recognition highlights the valuable research being carried out at St George's and the Trust's commitment to advancing clinical practice through evidence-based studies. Congratulations to Robert on this achievement.

St George's in the spotlight in new Netflix documentary



Netflix's new six-part series, Critical: Between Life and Death, hits the global streaming platform on Wednesday 23 July – and will showcase the work of the London Major Trauma System, including St George's.

Dr Anthony Hudson, Clinical Director for Major Trauma at St George's, said: "The now-established London Major Trauma System was the first of its kind, and it's a huge honour to know our work will be broadcast to a global audience.

"This behind-the-scenes series offers a fascinating insight into the work we do to care for patients across London and beyond in their greatest time of need, and I look forward to watching through one of the biggest streaming services in the world."

The series shines a light on some of the traumas captured during this filming – right from the moment emergency crews arrive on the scene, to the patient's subsequent care, treatment, and recovery in our hospital.

You'll be able to watch behind-the-scenes footage of lifesaving interventions, as well as personal and emotional interviews with our patients and staff.

The London Major Trauma System is a unique network of hospitals made up of four major trauma centres, including St George's, and a number of



trauma units, ambulance services and air ambulance services.

St George's pioneers UK's first hospital knife bin



St George's has taken a pioneering step in tackling knife crime by becoming the first hospital in the UK to install a secure knife surrender bin. The initiative has received widespread media attention, with coverage from BBC News, The Times, The Standard, The Independent, MyLondon, and The Express. The reports have highlighted the shocking images of weapons recovered from the bin and highlight our commitment to safety, as reinforced by Chief Executive Jacqueline Totterdell: "Keeping staff and patients safe is our top priority."

Launched in partnership with Wandsworth Council and Word 4 Weapons, the initiative aims to remove dangerous weapons from the streets and improve public safety. The first bin has already made an impact, with 87 weapons—including machetes, zombie knives, and knuckledusters—safely surrendered. Following this success, more bins will be installed at Epsom and St Helier hospitals, making St Helier the first hospital in Surrey to adopt the scheme.

The need for such measures is clear. Last year, St George's treated over 500 knife-related injuries nearly double the previous year's figure.

The Metropolitan Police and local leaders continue to encourage anyone carrying a knife to dispose of it safely and anonymously in these bins.

Governors go bare below the elbows

On 10th June our governors went bare below the elbows for their visits to the Outpatients departments around St George's Hospital.





During the visit the governors heard that staff feel they have very good working environment marked by respect and inclusive culture. They also learnt that there's a three-month in-house training programme which attracts and ensures staff retention.
